MSU-Northern Chancellor Announces Resignation

Dr. James Limbaugh announced his resignation as Chancellor of MSU-Northern effective 5:00 p.m. today (August 29).

During his tenure at Northern, Limbaugh was able to increase enrollment in the fall of 2013. He also advanced campus renovations that include a stabilization project of Donaldson Hall, the rebuilding of the campus' tennis courts, an extensive remodel of student dining facilities, the conservation and display of an impressive collection of Native American artifacts, as well as an extensive renovation of the gym floor and bleachers in the Armory Gym.

Montana State University President Waded Cruzado thanked Limbaugh for his dedication and service to Northern and its students.

"Chancellor Limbaugh is a life-long educator and he has always striven to do the best for students. Even in his resignation, he is putting students first so MSU-Northern can continue to move forward," Cruzado said. "I want to thank Chancellor Limbaugh for his dedicated service to MSU Northern and for his collaboration with the MSU campuses."



Student Orientation Reports Record Numbers



This year Northern's student orientation was attended by 190 students and many of their parents bringing the overall total to over 325 people, which is more than double last year's attendance. Ashley Betzel, the Student Orientation Coordinator, and her team did an outstanding job informing new and transfer students about Northern and all it has to offer.

MSUN Nursing Students Have Highest Pass Rate in Montana

MSU-Northern has been proud of its nursing students for many many years, but this year marks an achievement of special importance. The National Council of State Boards of Nursing has reported that year-to-date (January 1-June 30, 2014), MSUN has the highest pass rate of any nursing education program in the State of Montana-92.68%. Of 41 students taking the test, 38 passed.

"This success is a testament to the commitment and tireless efforts of our nursing educators to ensure that our students graduate from our program with the skills necessary to enter the health professions as qualified, confident nurses," explained MSU-Northern Chancellor Dr. James Limbaugh. "I would also like to recognize and congratulate Arlys Williams, our interim director, for her leadership in this achievement."

All nursing candidates for the ADN (Associate Degree in Nursing) are required to take and pass the NCLEX-RN (National Council Licensure Examination for Registered Nurses) for licensure in order "to ensure public protection" through measurement of "the competencies needed to perform safely and effectively as an entry-level nurse" (as quoted from the NCLEX website). Congratulations to the dedicated nursing and their hard-working, quality instructors.

Mothers and teachers generally instruct their children and students not to use phrases like "me and Jonny" or "Jonny, me, and the girls" when speaking or writing about themselves and others. The only

problem is, once people switch over to using phrases like "Jonny and I" or "Jonny, the girls, and I," the usage of "me" seems to disappear, even when it is appropriate. Consider the following sentence:

"When you are finished with your ballots, please bring them to Heather and I."

Many people would believe this sentence to be correct, but omit Heather from the picture. You get: "When you are finished with your ballots, please bring them to I." That doesn't work.

Use "I" when you are including yourself as part of the subject, like this: "Heather and I will count your ballots." When you are not the subject of the sentence, but rather the object, use "me." If this rule confuses you, just try this trick: Always omit the other person's or people's names and read or say the sentence including just yourself. Does "I" or "me" make sense? I hope this tip helps.
